I hope you will enjoy reading this newsletter and that it will provide you with some inspiration for your own work. We highly appreciate your feedback!

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
Constellations of State Fragility – a new online research tool

Researchers of the German Development Institute / Deutsches Institut für Entwicklungspolitik (DIE) have developed a new online database and visualisation for a more nuanced analysis of state fragility. The interactive map **Constellations of State Fragility** is also based on a new theoretical model, which the DIE researchers designed earlier.




When states become fragile, many challenges ensue for peace, global sustainability efforts and development cooperation. State fragility, however, appears in different forms. To allow observing these forms more easily, DIE researchers **Jörn Grävingholt** and **Constantin Ruhe**, together with **Sebastian Ziaja** of Heidelberg University and other colleagues, have developed a new theoretical model and database. They collected data for 171 countries worldwide that describe the three core functions of the state: the ability to enforce the state monopoly on violence (authority); the provision of basic public services as in health, education and administration (capacity); and the acceptance of the state's claim to set the rules (legitimacy). As a result, six distinct constellations of

state fragility can be distinguished: Countries such as Brazil, according to the results, mainly struggle with violence or crime, exposing low state authority. Others, such as Ghana, are in this perspective characterised by weak state capacity, leading to deficiencies in basic public services.

period from 2005 to 2015, provides indicator data for the state's core functions, allows comparing countries, downloading graphs and more.

Yale ISTF's Innovation Prize for Denise Matias

Klimalog researcher **Denise Margaret Matias** and her collaborator, Loreta Alsa, a member of the indigenous Tagbanua people from Palawan, Philippines was awarded the first

prize of Yale University's International Society of Tropical Foresters (ISTF) 5th Annual Innovation Prize on 3 February 2018.

Since 2014, Yale ISTF has offered an Innovation Prize at its annual conference to honor outstanding initiatives and ideas related to tropical forest use and conservation. Matias and Alsa won the prize on the basis of a collaborative partnership, which utilised the doctoral research results of Matias in restoring degraded land in the Tagbanua community forest. This project was funded through a grant from the Hand in Hand fund by Deutsche Umwelthilfe and the food company Rapunzel Naturkost. The award includes a US\$3,000 prize. This year's prize was chosen among entries from 33 researchers from 25 countries.

Climate risk financing workshop

Climate Analytics and the **Klimalog project** organized a climate risk financing workshop for non-annex I members of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage (WIM) on March 12, 2018 at the DIE. Reinhard Mechler (International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis), Sönke Kreft (Munich Climate Insurance Initiative), Olivia Serdeczny (Climate Analytics), Sujay Natson (Oxford University), and Denise Margaret Matias (DIE, Klimalog) provided expert inputs. The event took place the day before the start of the Seventh Meeting of the WIM Executive Committee.

News from the research programmes

News from the European Think Tank Group

The **European Think Tank Group (ETTg)**, a network of five leading development think tanks (DIE, European Centre for Development Policy Management, Istituto Affari Internazionali, Institut du Développement Durable et des Relations Internationales, Overseas Development Institute), has considerably enhanced its cooperation since October 2017. The objective of the ETTg is to help shape development debates in the EU and at the level of EU member states and to provide evidence-based policy recommendations for decision-makers. The ETTg currently works on three main topics: the integration of the **2030 Agenda** in EU external action, the negotiations on the next multiannual financial framework (MFF) as well as EU-Africa relations. New WBGU discussion paper on digitalization:

The **German Advisory Council on Global Change / Wissenschaftliche Beirat der Bundesregierung Globale Umweltveränderungen (WBGU)**, on which DIE-director **Dirk Messner** serves as co-chair, published the discussion paper **"Digitalization: What we need to talk about"** in the end of March. The Paper deals with questions which are emerging in the course of the digitalization and artificial intelligence. How can these transformations be used to solve humankind's great challenges? How will digitalisation change the coexistence of humankind on this planet? What goals will it serve? What opportunities and risks does it involve? Who will gain or lose power in its wake? The WBGU believes it is essential to shape digitalization

with a view to the necessary transformation towards sustainability. In this discussion, WBGU raises ten questions, which will be answered in a flagship report towards the end of the year.

Science Platform Sustainability 2030

The Steering Committee of the Science Platform Sustainability 2030, consisting of representatives of academia, industry and civil society, met on 23 February to discuss the state of the working groups on "the future of work", "responsible consumption" and "global commons". A working group on "traffic and mobility", chaired by DIE-Director **Dirk Messner** and the Director of the Potsdam Institute of Climate Impact Research **Hans Joachim Schellnhuber**, is currently emerging.


On 23 May, the Science Platform Sustainability 2030 and **SDSN Germany** will invite for the first time more than ten scientific advisory councils of the German government. The dialogue event is aimed at the exchange on future technological, economic, ecological and social dynamics and their impacts on sustainable development.

SDSN Germany

On 27 February, the seventh meeting of the extended Steering Committee of **SDSN Germany** took place on the invitation of economist at the Haus der Deutschen Wirtschaft, in Berlin. Participants included representatives from science, industry, civil society as well as different ministries. Innovations for sustainable development and the necessary policy framework were in the center of the lively discussions.

SDSN Germany supports the cooperation of the European Network of Political Foundations (ENoP) and SDSN. The cooperation aims to promote the inclusion of the SDGs as an integral part of the political agenda in Europe in light of the upcoming events on EU level, including the European elections in 2019 and the next Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF). The long-standing head of the [Managing Global Governance \(MGG\) Programme](#), [Thomas Fues](#), has retired with effect of March 2018. Already in November 2017, during the [Global MGG Alumni Conference](#), alumni and partners had the chance to bid farewell to Thomas. On 19 February, the directors of the DIE, [Dirk Messner](#) and [Imme Scholz](#), and colleagues said goodbye to him during an internal event. The DIE directors and colleagues honored his long-standing commitment to the MGG Network and the institute with farewell speeches and songs.

His core responsibilities as head of the former training department at the DIE and the MGG programme have been taken over by two successors. [Sven Grimm](#) is the new co-chair of the research programme [Inter- and](#)

[transnational Cooperation with the Global South](#), which includes the team knowledge cooperation and training, in which MGG is located. [Wulf Reiners](#) is the new head of the MGG programme, which remains a core constituent part of the knowledge cooperation and training division. The aim of the new structure with increased staff numbers is to jointly promote and expand cooperation with Southern powers in the areas of research, dialogue and training.

Capacity development for the 2030 agenda implementation – the role of civil servants

The [2030 Agenda](#) and its Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) have become universal guideposts for transformative change at the domestic and global level. While responsibility for the design of SDG policies lies with actors, such as parliaments and political leaders, public administration plays an indispensable role for operational implementation. Due to the novel and complex character of sustainability challenges, civil servants face the challenge how to effectively manage

the process of translating the 2030 Agenda to domestic frameworks and engaging in a cross-policy and multi-stakeholder environment.

With the aim to share related experiences and good practices, the [Managing Global Governance \(MGG\)](#) team jointly with [Brazil's National School of Administration \(ENAP\)](#) organized a workshop in Brasilia from 26 February to 1 March 2018. Geared towards the peer exchange on the training for civil servants and national SDG implementation, the four-day seminar brought together representatives from public administration schools from Brazil, China, Ger-

many, India, Indonesia, Mexico, South Africa and international organization, as well as researchers and practitioners engaged in relevant knowledge cooperation and training formats. The workshop comprised a series of expert panels to share perspectives from the different countries and regions on three major fields: capacity development for public officials, horizontal and vertical coordination and the role of data in SDG implementation. Beyond that, in the framework of working groups the event also served the purpose to jointly develop course offers for civil servants as well as a joint application for a HLPF side-event session for UNDESA's and UNITAR's "SDGs Learning, Training & Practice" initiative.

MGG Academy alumni present the Sustainable Ideas Game in the UN Global Festival of Action for Sustainable Development

During their time at DIE, they developed an educational tool named "The Bookinho" to support reflection, interaction and action on the 2030 Agenda. The interactive part of "The Bookinho" is the "Sustainable Ideas Game", a board game designed to generate practical ideas and engage people in the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals in their daily lives.

The group was selected by the UN SDG Action Campaign to present the project during the UN Global Festival of Action for Sustainable Development, held in the World Conference Center in Bonn, from March 21st until March 23rd. The game attracted a lot of interest due to its fun and interactive gameplay but mostly because it is a powerful enabler for transforming knowledge into action.

Alongside the main event, the group conducted sessions in different institutions, including the Siebengebirgsgymnasium in Bad Honnef where the game was played by a group of teenagers, as well as the UNFCCC, where climate change experts generated



ready-to-implement ideas. The group also had meetings with Engagement Global, the UN System Staff College (UNSSC), the Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) Expert Net and with the UNFCCC Executive Secretary, Mrs Patricia Espinosa. The aim of these meetings was to discuss further action to mainstream the game and make it available for trainers, educators and multipliers across the globe as a tool for generating action on the 2030 Agenda.

Staff News

Mirja Schoderer wins the VU Master Thesis Prize 2017

[Mirja Schoederer](#), a Master student of Environment and Resource Management at the Institute for Environmental Studies of VU University Amsterdam and since summer 2017 researcher at DIE, won the prize

for her research on the effect of water harvesting on drought vulnerability of farmer households in Kenya.



She concludes that these systems reduce their drought vulnerability by 40 percent. Other determinants of vulnerability are whether or not an off-farm income exists, the number of livelihood activities that a household engages in and the households economic situation. Her research shows that households with water harvesting systems use less time to gather water. This time can be used for as attending school, or economic activities. The excess water, however, is only sparsely used by households to irrigate crops. This is subject for further research.

The jury report praises Mirja on the amount of work she has done to gather the information, thoughtful analysis of the data, and her excellent English writing. **According to the jury** her relevant work shows a critical scientific mentality, following a thorough scientific method, and ending with a good discussion of the results and their implications.

Review Events

Influence of values on the effectiveness of democracy promotion

During a workshop held on 7 and 8 December 2017, DIE staff presented final results of the research project **“What’s democracy’s value? The influence of values on the effectiveness of democracy promotion”**. In an inspiring exchange, practitioners and researchers discussed how societal value orientations and democracy promotion shape each other. When domestic actors and donors hold diverging value orientations concerning family- and gender-related policy reforms (i.e. in family, gender equality or LGBTI law), the chances of political liberalisation are reduced. Thus, sequentially orchestrated use of both cooperative and sanctioning instruments is key to supporting liberalisation in the long run. Hawa Ba (OSIWA), Prof. Gyimah-Boadi (Afrobarometer), Adrian Jjuuko (Human Rights Awareness and Promotion Forum-Uganda) as well as Prof. Richard Youngs (Carnegie Endowment for International Peace), among others, delivered presentations.

Green industrial policies lead economies to a sustainable future

Green industrial policies can be instrumental in helping countries stay within their planetary boundaries while creating employment opportunities. This is one of the conclusions of a new report, **“Green Industrial Policy: Concept, Policies, Country Experiences”** launched by UN Environment and the German Development Institute on Saturday, 16 December 2017, in Beijing. The launch event, which took place on the sidelines of the **China Council for International Cooperation on Environment and Development (CCICED)**, highlighted the role of green industrial policy in China’s shift towards sustainable development.

The report is the most up-to-date and comprehensive overview of green industrial policy available, and showcases how and in what ways countries can benefit from a green transformation. With examples from Morocco, Brazil, Germany and China, it presents possible policy options to foster structural change towards environmental sustainability and increased well-being.

Water – value for life – How does water connect NRW and the world?

On 11 January 2018, the **Johannes-Rau-Society (JRF)** had organised an event entitled **“Water – value for life – How does water connect NRW and the world?”** at the North Rhine-Westphalian Academy of Sciences, Humanities and the Arts in Düsseldorf.

At the opening of the event the JRF-chairman Dieter Bathen and the Minister for Culture and Science, Isabel Pfeiffer-Poensgen, addressed the audience with a short welcoming speech. Five member institutes of the JRF had jointly shaped the framework of the event: the German Development Institute / Deutsches Institut für Entwicklungspolitik (DIE), the International Center for Conversion (BICC), the IWW Water Centre, the ILS – Research Institute for Regional and Urban Development and the FiW – Research Institute for Water and Waste Management at RWTH Aachen. **Ines Dombrowsky**, Chair of the Programme **“Environmental Governance and Transformation to Sustainability”** at DIE, addressed in her presentation the question of whether the EU Water Framework Directive could serve as a planning tool for integrated water resources management in developing countries. She reported on her experiences in Mongolia, where significant urbanization and resource boom take place. Some aspects of the Water Framework Directive are transferable to Mongolia. Indeed, the applicability depends a lot on local implementation capacities. The presentation of Lars Wirkus, BICC, outlined connections between water insecurity and fragility. Tim aus der Beek, IWW, focused upon the topic **“Water pollution - Made in China or Made in Germany”**. Stefan Siedentop from ILS attracted attention to projects in North Rhine-Westphalia and informed the audience about the renaissance of **“water”** in urban development. Friedrich Wilhelm Bolle, FiW, commented on water footprint in textile industry. Focusing on different aspects while dealing with the issue of water shows how important interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary approaches are for the investigation of such complex issues.

Following the individual lectures, two panel discussions took place, first with the researchers themselves, then with practitioners: Daniela Krahl from of the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, Rainer Meckenstock from of the University Duisburg-Essen, and Marijana Todorovic from of the Forum Environment and Development. The sessions were mod-

erated by JRF board member Uwe Schneidewind. After the event, guests and panellists used the opportunity to exchange views at a reception.

Workshop on impact assessment in governance programmes

The findings of the DIE research project **“impact assessment of citizen participation support in the context of decentralisation in Benin”** were the focus of a two-day workshop by the GIZ in Cotonou, Benin. The research project analysed, if and how the GIZ **“Programme to Support Decentralisation and Community Development”** had an effect on the quality of citizen participation and public services at local level. The impact assessment in Benin is part of a cooperation of DIE and GIZ on the topic of **„Impact Assessment in Governance Programmes“**.

The goal of the workshop in Benin was to discuss with the partners of the GIZ the implications of the results for program steering in the next phase. In total, 40 participants, who are involved in the support of citizen participation in Benin, were present at the workshop. In addition to representatives from the Ministry of Decentralisation and Local Governance, several mayors and key civil society representatives, the German embassy, the GIZ Country Director, the European Union as well as other donors were present during the discussion.

„Solutions for the G20 – Shaping global policy-making through think tank cooperation“

On 24 January, nearly two month after the end of the German G20-presidency, the North Rhine-Westphalian state representative in Brussel and the German Development Institute / Deutsches Institut für Entwicklungspolitik (DIE) organized a well-attended evening **event** on the conclusion of the German G20-presidency and the role of Think Tanks within this context.

Mark Speich, NRW-State Secretary for Federal and European Affairs as well as International Affairs, appreciated in his welcoming speech the work of the DIE in light of the Think Tank 20 (T20). At the same time, he valued the Hamburger summit documents as substantive result with a resilient commitment to multilateralism in challenging times. **Dirk Messner**, last year's co-chair of T20, described in his lecture the close involvement of the engagement groups like T20, B20 and W20 during the German G20 presidency. He outlined the productive and dynamic cooperation between the nearly 150 Think Tanks involved. During this time, more than 70 **policy briefs** were published and discussed with G20-policymakers. Messner provided an insight into the „**20 Solutions for the G20**“ document, showcased its proposal for using tax instruments to accelerate decarbonisation paths while reducing social inequalities. The paper, result of the dialogue-process, was handed over to

the federal government in the person of Peter Altmaier, former head of the chancellery, by the T20-Co-Chairs on 30 May 2017. Following the lectures, Ute Lange moderated a discussion about the results of the German G20 presidency, with Antoine Kasel, member of the Cabinet of the EU Commission President Juncker and Sherpa for G7- and G20 processes, Michael Gahler MdEP (CDU/EVP), member of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the European Parliament and Dirk Messner as participators. For Kasel, the agreement on the political shaping of globalization was one important message of the summit. Despite the Trump administration, Michael Gahler, who reported from the practice of the European Parliament, did not see the transatlantic, parliamentary dialogue endangered. A second thread of discussion examined whether, following the positive conclusions of successful G20 think-tank cooperation, similar approaches would be conceivable for the European Union as well.

New Project on Sustainable Public Procurement Kicks off

With its kick-off workshop on 25 and 26 January 2018, the new project **“Municipalities Promoting and Shaping Sustainable Value Creation (MUPASS) – Public Procurement for Fair and Sustainable Production”** officially started. Lead by the German Development Institute / Deutsches Institut für Entwicklungspolitik (DIE), implementation will take place in close cooperation with the Service Agency Communities in One World (SKEW) of Engagement Global and the Federal Ministry for Economic Co-Operation and Development (BMZ).

Corresponding to at least 10 percent to 20 percent of most countries' GDP, public pro-

curement has a huge potential leverage effect to make economic development more socially inclusive and ecologically sound if combined with respective requirements. A large part of those spendings is carried out by sub-national entities – hence MUPASS focusses on municipalities as main actors. Together with over 30 international experts on sustainable public procurement (SPP), the project team discussed options to refine the focus of the project's three core elements: (1) identifying factors of successful SPP governance in Europe, Latin America and sub-Saharan Africa; (2) analyzing social effects of SPP procedures in selected supply chains; (3) organizing transformative city dialogues among stakeholders from the Global South and North on SPP.



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The workshop participants gave precious input on all project elements and showed high interest in cooperating in the next project steps. What made the workshop a success was however not only the content input but particularly the enthusiasm for the topic and the project targets, that further underlines the potential and necessity of the project.

At the event „KlimaForum“ of the project „KlimaDiskurs NRW“ on 26 February 2018, Dirk Messner talked about „Transformation towards sustainability- NRW as a pioneering region“. Afterwards he attended a panel discussion together with Economy Minister Andreas Pinkwart and other panelists on „NRW as an engine for climate protection in other industrial regions“.

The World in 2050 - TWI2050

On 29 and 30 January 2018, DIE-Director Dirk Messner, and the programme chairs Julia Leininger und Ines Dombrowsky organized a scientifically high-caliber workshop in the context of the initiative „The World in 2050“. The workshop entitled „The World in 2050: Societal and political drivers of the global transformation“ brought together different strands of social science on political and social transformations in the context of the implementation of 2030 Agenda as well as integrated assessment modelers who aim at modelling Sustainable Development pathways until the year 2050.

Participants included the Directors of DIE, Dirk Messner as well as of the International Development Studies Institute (IDS), Melissa Leach, of the International Institute for Environment and Development (IIED), Andrew Norton and of the Stockholm Resilience Centre (SRC), Johan Rockström as well as the Vice Director of the International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis (IIASA), Nebojsa Nakicenovic. The DIE also participated during the 3rd Annual Meeting of The World in 2050 on 4-5 March 2018 in Vienna and will contribute to a report by the Initiative for the High Level Political Forum (HLPF) in July 2018 in New York.

Workshop on SDGs and MFR

With the next Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF), the EU will define not only the financial but also the political priorities until 2030. The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) could offer a norma-

tive framework for a social, ecological and economically more sustainable EU budget. During an internal workshop SDG- and MFF-experts from academia and several German ministries discussed concrete policy options how to embed the 2030 Agenda within the MFF and how Germany could engage in the MFF negotiations. The experts agreed that the integration of the 2030 Agenda into the MFF would not be an easy task. The EU has not yet developed its own SDG strategy. Moreover, there are relatively few actors who advocate for the integration of the SDGs into the MFF. Those in the

European Commission, member states and parliament responsible for implementing the SDGs would therefore have to contribute concrete proposals to the MFF negotiations through various channels. The expert workshop was organised by the German Development Institute / Deutsches Institut für Entwicklungspolitik (DIE), German Institute for International and Security Affairs / Stiftung Wissenschaft und Politik (SWP), **European Think Tank Group (ETTG)** and the Sustainable Development Solution Network Deutschland (SDSN Germany). 

DIE-Publication Update
