

## Khalid Malik

Khalid Malik is the Director of the UNDP Human Development Report Office since June 2011. He has held a variety of senior management and substantive positions in the United Nations. He served as UN Resident Coordinator in China (2003–2010), Director, UNDP Evaluation Office (1997-2003) and Chair, UN Evaluation Group, and other senior level advisor positions. Earlier he was UN Representative in Uzbekistan. He has been active on UN reform and has worked closely with development partners and UN intergovernmental bodies. In 2009, Mr. Malik was one of ten “champions” - and the only foreigner - to be honored for their contributions to the protection of the environment in China. Mr. Malik has written widely on a range of topics. His latest book *"Why China Has Grown So Fast for So Long"* was published in 2012 by Oxford University Press. Earlier, he co-edited *"Capacity for Development: New Solutions to Old Problems"* (2002), and *Lessons Learned in Crisis and Post Conflict Situations* (2002).



## Dr. Gabriele Köhler

Currently, Gabriele Köhler is an independent development economist, advisor and publicist based in Munich and visiting fellow at the “United Nations Research Institute for Social Development” (UNRISD) and the “Institute of Development Studies” (IDS) in Sussex. She advised the United Nations and European Union and gives lectures in numerous universities (Munich, Seoul ect.). Her expertise’s include development policy and agendas (notably the MDGs), economic and social policies around employment, decent work and social protection. She can look back at a long UN-career, working for various UN institutions around the world. As the United Nations Resident Coordinator, UNDP Resident-Representative and UNFPA Representative in Latvia (2002-2004), she directed interagency programmes on social inclusion, good governance, public policy, environmental management and youth and health. Her latest publications include *"Development and Welfare Policy"* (with Deepta Chopra), *"Post-2015: We do not want to be mainstreamed into a polluted stream..."* and *"Beyond 2015 or back to the 1980s?"*



## Dr. Heike Kuhn

Heike Kuhn is Head of Division for “Millennium Development Goals, poverty reduction, social protection, sectoral and thematic policies” at the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) in Bonn (Germany). She has a background of more than 20 years in European and multilateral development cooperation. Ms Kuhn has long-standing experience in leading and managing multilateral negotiations at European and UN-level, lately as Alternate Representative at the Permanent Representation of the Federal Republic of Germany to FAO, WFP and as Executive Board Director to IFAD. Her recent responsibilities included financial oversight of 3.2 billion EUR p.a. and of 700 employees (about 700 persons in HQ and abroad). Ms Kuhn holds a Ph.D. in Administrative Sciences from the University of Speyer (Germany) on “The social dimension of the European Community” and she is a fully qualified lawyer, having studied in Freiburg/Germany, Moscow/USSR, Los Angeles/USA and Genoa/Italy. She is fluent in six languages.



## Dr. Markus Loewe

Markus Loewe is senior researcher in the “Sustainable Economic and Social Development” department and team leader of the research project “Political economy of pro-poor growth” at the German Development Institute. His areas of work include the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) and the Post 2015 Agenda, Development and promotion of small and medium enterprises, Demographic change and social protection, on which he holds a PhD from the Ruprecht-Karls-University of Heidelberg. He is member of various Advisory Boards and the working group of “Social Protection” of the European Association of Development Research and Training Institutes. Beate Wagner is the Secretary General of the United Nations Association Germany since 2002. She is a graduate in political science from Marburg University. Her doctorate thesis in international politics was accepted at Free University Berlin at the Center for Transatlantic Foreign and Security Policy in 1994. Between 1992 and 1995 she was the assistant to the Permanent Undersecretary for Federal and European affairs with the Berlin State Government. From 1995 until 2002 Wagner was Director of Programme at the bi-national RIAS BERLIN COMMISSION. Since October 2002 she represents the United Nations Association of Germany nationally and internationally. She is Member in the Coordinating Committee of Forum Menschenrechte, the national umbrella organization of German human rights NGOs. From 2006 until 2012 she was also Vice President of the World Federation of United Nations Associations.
